REGULATORY RELIEF

Guidance to Help Financial Institutions and Facilitate Recovery in Areas of Nebraska Affected by Severe Weather

Highlights:

- Severe weather during September 13-14, 2010, caused significant property damage in areas of Nebraska.
- A federal disaster was declared on October 21, 2010, for selected counties in Nebraska.
- The FDIC is encouraging banks to work constructively with borrowers experiencing difficulties beyond their control because of damage caused by the severe weather.
- Extending repayment terms, restructuring existing loans or easing terms for new loans, if done in a manner consistent with sound banking practices, can contribute to the health of the community and serve the long-term interests of the lending institution.
- The FDIC also will consider regulatory relief from certain filing and publishing requirements.
